PMW's Ramblings with Craig Dabbs - Lost Clubs - Dorking FC

The advent of John McClure's Your Football Page recently gave me an idea. It saves me lots of writing if I can get others to do it for me. John has given me permission to take what I like, but Craig is a bit special (he's my mini-bus driver) therefore permission was sought directly from the man himself. Incidentally, Craig has supplied one Binfield front cover, plus an insight into the Wimbledon clubs, which up to that point had confused me completely. Thanks Craig - your comp entrance is on the gate. Just let me know?

Dorking 1880-2017 at Meadowbank (Prior to re-development) 1953-2013



Both clubs technically still exist, although Dorking FC who closed in 2017 were absorbed into Dorking Wanderers. In reality there's nothing left of the club, that were the main team in the town for well over one hundred years.

The Chicks played their early years in the Mid Surrey League, until becoming founder members of the Surrey County Senior League in 1922 and moved to Meadowbank in 1953. The ground was a gem with the pitched roof stand built shortly after it opened and behind it the spire of St Martin's Church providing the backdrop and with the other bits of rickety cover it made for such a charming ground.

Those early days saw Meadowbank's record attendance set at 4,500 for a FA Cup game against Folkestone Town, they were playing as a Corinthian League club then moving to the Athenian League in 1963. They stayed and eventually struggled in the league then in 1974 they merged with Guildford City to become Guildford & Dorking United.

It didn't go well, the club were in the Southern League Premier Division and finished rock bottom, 75/76 was also a struggle in Division One South, the following season saw the club resign from the league. Dorking Town were formed in 1977 in the Surrey Senior League and by 1983 it was back to Dorking FC in the Isthmian League. The clubs stay in the league lasted until 2006 when they joined the Combined Counties League.

The club was struggling both on and off the field and Meadowbank was closed due to safety concerns. The club soldiered on with Meadowbank out of action until 2017, the club just couldn't continue and closed in same year, swept up by the new kids in town Dorking Wanderers, who moved into a revamped Meadowbank along with the county FA.

PMW's Ramblings with Craig Dabbs - Lost Grounds - Hendon FC

Lost Grounds - Hendon FC - Claremont Road, Hendon (1926-2008)

Another lost London ground, Claremont Road was home to Hendon FC for 82 years. When the club were offered the site they moved quickly preparing the ground and constructing the stand which survived to the end.

The venue had large swathes of terracing and could and did hold more than the 3,000 capacity, 9,000 attended an FA Cup tie against Northampton Town in 1952 giving you an idea of it's size.

Aside from the main stand there was a sizeable cover opposite, known as the Gordon Raymond terrace, it used to run virtually the full length of that one side but was cut down considerably later on.

The ground staged other notable matches down the years, Wolverhampton Wanderers would send a team featuring Ron Flowers, Peter Broadbent and Alan Hinton for the floodlight switch on in 1962 and in 1967 it became an Olympic venue staging a qualifying game between Great Britain and West Germany.



Wealdstone were the last visitors in 2008 when 280 spectators watched the curtain come down on this great venue. The £10 million estimated value of the land too good to ignore. The ground is now a housing estate. The club upped sticks and now play at Silver Jubilee Park, former home to Kingsbury Town, much more modest and much easier to maintain, nevertheless London lost another classic non-league venue, such a shame.

[Ed: Like Wealdstone's Lower Mead ground in Harrow, this is another excruciating tale of a non-league club losing their ground. When I supported Wealdstone, I visited Claremont Road many times. The

former grounds of Hendon, Kingstonian, Leytonstone, Tooting & Mitcham, Walthamstow Avenue were majestic sporting arenas and however biased 'Stones fans can be, these grounds were very special, but Hendon always topped my list. The 'away' fixture was usually on Boxing Day, a game played in front of 2,000 spectators, although I can't remember Wealdstone winning many of them.

In 2009, after a break of some 30 years, I returned to watching non-league football. I was amazed that Tooting & Mitcham United had a new ground, and so did Enfield Town. To commemorate the occasion, I presented Enfield Town with 50 toilet rolls]

ORGANISING a game of football, at any level, is no easy task.

From ground staff to safety officers, from stewards to caterers, these people – volunteers more often than not – play a vital role in the day-to-day running of a matchday to ensure a safe and welcoming environment for all those who click through the turnstiles.

But there is one thing that even these superheroes just can not control – the weather!

As I'm sure you are all well aware, temperatureslast week plummeted to 12-year lows in some parts of the UK, putting all best-laid plans into jeopardy. The now obligatory winter footage of groundsmen and women up and down the country braving the big freeze to sweep snow off the pitch swamped social media, while fans too leant a helping hand. At Macclesfield, for example, early morning pleas from the club to join in the clean-up operation and ensure their game with Ramsbottom United went ahead were answered by a large pool of their loyal fanbase and they certainly played their part in a 4-0 win. But, unfortunately, these things don't always go quite to plan and when Jack Frost does decide to play havoc with the football calendar things can get, well, a little bit ice-cold.

Let's start with AFC Rushden & Diamonds, for example, after players, staff, officials and fans were left "furious" after their Southern League Premier Central match at Needham Market was called off just 40 minutes before kick-off, ensuring a wasted 174-mile round trip. Later that evening, Needham Market said in a statement: "The football club would like to put on record it's sincere apologies to everyone connected to our opponents AFC Rushden & Diamonds, Needham Market players and staff, and supporters of both teams who arrived for the 1:00pm kick off."Upon the match officials arrival they carried out a pitch inspection but despite much deliberation they agreed to postpone the match at 12:15pm.

"No further comment will be made by the Football Club surrounding the issue."

And it wasn't just AFC Rushden & Diamonds left with a bitter pill to swallow. Hendon, too, were left aggrieved after travelling two-and-a-half hours to Yate Town - on a coach costing over £1,000 - only for the game to be called off shortly after their arrival. To make matters worse for the Greens, Yate's Lodge Road pitch had reportedly passed a 10am inspection carried out by the referee's assistant. Furious Hendon boss Lee Allinson tweeted at the time: "Arrived at Yate, two-and-a-half hours on a coach, game off! Shambles, nowhere near playable." And it was the same also for Hendon's league rivals Winchester City, who suffered the same fate of a late postponement on their arrival at Poole Town's Black Gold Stadium.

Sadly, this is nothing new in Non-League football. While 90 per cent of postponements are announced in good time to prevent the visiting team from travelling unnecessarily, there will always be occasions where it's difficult to avoid. I do feel, though, that in an era where we can send a man to the moon and launch the worldwide web then surely a protocol can be put in place to prevent this from continuously happening? Safety of the players can never be compromised when it comes to frozen pitches – and if last-minute calls suggest that a pitch may be 50/50 playable, then I would argue that it's not.

But is there the slightest possibility that the Football Association and/or individual leagues, can sit down and devise a routine inspection system – taking into account the distance travelled by the visiting team – where calls must be made before a certain time by local officials to clear the situation of any such doubt? No-one wants any frosty atmospheres at Christmas.

Have a good one. From Sec - Groundsman should make these decisions not officials who are likly to have seen the pitch once in a blue moon

ASHFORD TOWN FOOTBALL CLUB POTTED HISTORY

The 2008-09 season saw Ashford begin the campaign in electrifying form, winning their opening six matches to top the table. Mark Butler's side followed this up with a fantastic FA Cup run which saw them come agonisingly close to eliminating Forest Green Rovers in the Fourth Qualifying Round at Short Lane. Rovers won the replay and went on to run Derby County close in the Third Round. Ashford endured a difficult winter, which saw them flirt with relegation, before a late resurgence saw the side safely into mid-table. The cup competitions added much adventure to the season, as Ashford followed up their exploits in the FA Cup with runs to the semi-finals of both the Middlesex Senior and Isthmian League Cups and end their campaign by defeating Conference Premier outfit Woking 3-2 at Metropolitan Police to win the Surrey Senior Cup. The 2009-10 season saw Ashford make a reasonable start to the campaign, but the Ash Trees were shocked when manager Mark Butler tendered his resignation on Friday 23rd October, in order to take up the Manager's role at Margate, who were struggling at the foot of the table. Ashford appointed former Leicester City and Bradford City midfielder Jamie Lawrence as his replacement, and the Jamaican international immediately led his new charges on a twelve-match unbeaten run. However, issues off the pitch were causing problems for the club and a number of players, including leading goalscorer Byron Harrison left for Carshalton Athletic, where Mark Butler had accepted a coaching role after leaving Margate, where he had been in charge for just three months. Ashford found scoring a problem after Harrison left and a dreadful run of form saw them go from the fringe of the play-off zone to battling relegation. Ashford went into their final match knowing a win would almost guarantee survival, while a draw would see them finish fourth from bottom – technically a relegation place, but certain to receive a reprieve owing to the demise of various other clubs. Sadly, a heavy defeat for Ashford, coupled with wins for Carshalton and Margate saw the latter two clubs survive - Margate receiving the reprieve for finishing fourth from

During the summer of 2010, the club were initially placed in the Central Division of the Southern League but were then offered the chance to remain at Step Three of the non-league pyramid. However, as this offer was as a direct replacement for defunct Southern League side Merthyr Tydfil, the decision was made that the vast increase in travelling would be too great a burden for the club and the club elected to remain in the Central Division. During this time, Bob Parker stepped down from his role as Chairman after twenty-eight years in the role. The club's home ground was renamed the Robert Parker Stadium in honour of Bob, who remains at the club as President.

The club entered a new era in the Central Division of the Southern League with Jamie Lawrence at the helm and with a mixture of established local players and new faces but the season was a challenging one. The club played some sparkling football at times and enjoyed an exciting run in the FA Trophy, reaching the Last 32 in the competition before losing at home to Dartford. However, League form was patchy and the club finished 16th. One bright spark was the club winning the Southern Combination Cup, defeating Hanworth Villa 1-0 in the Final.

Jamie Lawrence resigned as Manager in June 2011 and the club immediately appointed his assistant, Paul Burgess, to take the helm after more than 21 years at the club, including 683 First Team appearances. Despite having little time to do it and few resources at his disposal, "Burgo" assembled a young and exciting team. Although any hopes of a tilt at the promotion play-offs were dashed by a dreadful run where the club failed to win at home for four months, Ashford finished the season strongly, winning two Cup Finals in 48 hours. In the Middlesex Charity Cup Final, the Ash Trees were 3-0 down to Northwood after 48 minutes before substitute Kofi Lockhart-Adams scored four times to put his team ahead. The game finished 4-4, with Ashford winning the penalty shoot-out 4-2. Two days later, Ashford defeated Badshot Lea 3-1 to add the Aldershot Senior Cup to the cabinet, aided by a fine performance from Paul McCarthy, who had saved two penalties in the first Final. A memorable season was capped by the club being named winners of the Southern League Fair Play Award.

The 2012-13 campaign saw Ashford reach the Final of the Middlesex Senior Cup against near-neighbours Staines Town. However, Ashford were unable to claim the trophy, eventually falling to a 2-0 defeat. At the end of that season, assistant manager Steve Battams left the club for work reasons. Youth Team Manager Ben Murray, who had been coaching at Ashford since his teens and won an FA Community Award, was promoted into the senior management team.

An awful start to the 2013-14 season saw the Ash Trees cut adrift at the foot of the Southern League Central Division and Paul Burgess was relieved of his duties after an 8-1 defeat at Dunstable Town. Ben Murray was appointed Manager and although results did not improve initially, performances and discipline did. A rally during the final months of the campaign offered hope of a remarkable 'great escape', although relegation was confirmed at North Greenford United.

As a result, Ashford returned to the Combined Counties League. The Ash Trees were able to renew a number of old friendships and friendly rivalries and the greater number of local matches rekindled some enthusiasm that had been lost towards the end of Ashford's time in the Southern League. The Ash Trees first campaign back in the competition saw Ashford finish third, while their second saw Town claim promotion.

The club's return to Step 4 was earned after Ashford finished second in the League, thanks to a remarkable end-of-season run which saw the Ash Trees finish the season with 96 points. This was 10 points behind the Champions, Hartley Wintney, but as 'The Row' did not then have the requisite facilities to play at Step 4, they could not go up. They helped Ashford to do so by defeating Camberley Town in their final match to ensure that Ashford claimed the runners-up spot. Ashford's reward was a third brief spell in the Southern League. A good start to the 2016-17 season allayed any fears that a return to the Central Division would see a repeat of the club's previous struggles, while a genuine highlight of the campaign was a third triumph in the Middlesex Charity Cup. The Final saw Ashford defeat Wealdstone of the National League to claim the magnificent trophy.

For 2017-18, what had been the Central Division of the Southern League became the East Division. Awful weather made for a difficult season for all clubs and contributed to Ashford's campaign petering out into a mid-table finish. A new reorganisation of the National League System sees the club move back into the Isthmian League as members of the South Central Division for 2018-19. The 2018-19 season was another mid table finish with us also through to the Final of the Middlesex Charity Cup although just losing out to Uxbridge. Ben Murray then decided to stand down after his 6 year tenure as first team manager. The board and team were grateful for the results and hard work he had put in over the years. Up Stepped Russell Canderton to take the reins (having played nearly 700 games for the club).

The 2019-2020 season is the season that never was. We got part way through the season to then be instructed to go into lockdown due to the Corona Virus Pandemic and the FA decided to expunge the whole season.

Season 2020-21 The Fa decided to curtail this season as well (however still deciding to do the Full restructure of the FA pyramid).

21-22 see us stay in the Isthmian League (South Central Division) with one of the shortest distances to travel throughout the season that we have seen for some years. Having gone through 3 managers this season it was particularly difficult but we managed to Finish mid table after a slow start. 22-23 sees our previous goal keeper Paul McCarthy take to the helm after seeing us safely through



the latter part of last season
