





Binfield FC offer a very warm welcome to everyone for today's Pitching In Isthmian South Central League game against Southall Football Club.

Southall FC was founded in 1871, making it one of England's oldest football clubs and they celebrated their 150th anniversary in 2021. They played friendlies for the first 20 years before joining the West London League. Their recent history involved them playing in both the Combined Counties and Spartan South Midland leagues. They were Spartan South Midland Division One champions in 2017–18

before then playing in the Combined Counties Premier division the following season. The Moles lost 2-1 to Southall in an away fixture earlier in the season. We went behind to two early goals and despite completely dominating the game for the last 30 minutes of the game, we just couldn't find a way past the inspirational Southall keeper who made some outstanding saves for which he rightly won the man of the match award.

The Moles come into today's game on the back of a 0-1 defeat to Basingstoke on Tuesday evening down at Hill Farm Lane. Played in front of a loud and boisterous crowd, the game which was dubbed as "The Title Decider" by a few over excited inexperienced optimists, didn't disappoint in terms of both quality and determination by both sides. A proper game of non-league football at its best and a real credit to both sides. The celebrations at the end of the game reminded me of the wild celebrations a few years back at the Nou Camp when Barcelona beat Liverpool 3-0 in the first leg of that Champions League tie. We all know the dangers of premature celebrations and with so many games still to play this season, our opponents may just be heading to North Camp to lick their ego's come early May \(\delta\). I'm not bitter, we have plenty of that wonderful stuff behind the bar.

With loads of very important games coming up at home in February, I would just like to thank our wonderful club volunteers who continue to give up their time to support the matchday experience. The club will shortly be looking to advertise some very exciting and important roles within the club which would possibly suit anyone who's looking to break the boredom/monotony of retirement and get involved with some rather lovely eccentric folk who love being part of a wonderful football community here in Binfield.

Today is going to be another tough and competitive fixture – let's all hope it's half as good as what we've already seen these past few weeks. "C'mon you Moles"

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



Anders always plans ahead and posts his proposed itinerary on the Internet on a site called Non League Matters. Part of one such trip was earmarked for the North Wales coastline, so I politely asked if I could join him. In fact, two years in a row, we spent the first week of the new year, either based in Caernarfon or Llandudno. We took in as much football, as we could find and just for starters, I joined him at Penrith of all places. That was my second visit to Penrith and it snowed both times.

On to North Wales and games were taken at Caernarfon Town, Conwy Borough (twice), Llandudno, Prestatyn Town and Llanberis. Each and everyone of them had their own individual story, but my two visits to Conwy Borough saw the home club concede 15 goals in the two games. 1-11 was not a happy scoreline for Conwy Borough.

The 'pick' just had to be Llanberis and a game I was not expecting to be played. The previous day, I had driven past the ground on my way to Pen-y-Pass. Up above the snowline, then the car seized up on ice in the viewpoint car park. The peak of Snowdon was stark white, but the lower levels were free from snow. Eventually, I was able to turn the car around and on my way back, I stopped at Llanberis's ground. One lone groundsman was hard at work, but with all the snow around, surely this was a thankless task, as it would only be a matter of time before the snow arrived and the game would be cancelled.

To my surprise, there had been no further snow overnight and at 2 degrees C, neither would it be frozen. The game went ahead, although I was told for Llanberis to play a home game is January was an extreme rarity. I knew all along, what the groundsman was doing? If you're local, you know your weather. Llanberis lost 0-4 to Llangefni Town, which I believe is the second largest town on the Isle of Anglesey (and that's another story).











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
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SHEPPEY UNITED

Basingstoke Town defeat Binfield- narrowly- to open up a larger gap. Woods slip up, and Westfield go eighth

Our two form sides went head to head as Binfield welcomed our leaders Basingstoke Town. The Moles were seven games unbeaten, and had defeated their opponents twice already this season- but it was the visitors who left with the points and gained a modicum of revenge for those earlier reverses by scoring the only goal of the game. George Reid got it, sixteen minutes from time, taking his tally for the season to twelve, and the hosts ended with ten men, Massimo Giamattei departing only slightly early just before full time. That's ten wins from their last eleven for Town, who look unstoppable.

Northwood have developed an inconsistency which has seen them fall from the summit to third place, and it continued last night as they lost for the third time in four matches. Half time saw the Woods ahead, Josh Helmore opening the scoring on thirty eight minutes, but it all went wrong for our promotion hopefuls in the closing stages, Aiden Brown levelling from the spot and Reyon Dillon securing an away win four minutes from time. Sports open up a five point gap on the bottom four.

Westfield welcomed Ashford Town to Woking. The hosts had hit a sticky patch which had taken them out of the promotion picture, only one win from their last ten- but they will hope that they have put that to bed after Marvin Herschel, on loan from Dartford, headed home the only goal of the game nine minutes from time. The Tangerines are fifteenth.

In the South East Beckenham Town go second after a win over the leaders, Hythe end Bridges fine home run, Faversham finally get a win, and Chichester win the A27 derby

Our leaders, Chatham Town, faced what looked to be a tricky evening as they travelled to third place Beckenham Town- and tricky was exactly how it turned out. The Chats have been magnificent at home, winning every match, but their away form had been something of an achilles heel and Becks closed the gap between themselves and their opponents to one point with two late goals. After eighty goalless minutes the hosts opened the score in the eighty first, Louie Theophanous doing what he does best, before doubling their advantage right at the end through Jamarie Brissett. That's eight wins from ten for Beckenhamone more than their visitors have managed.

Littlehampton Town hosted Faversham Town for the second time this month. It looked as if the Lilywhites were going to win their last encounter before it was unfortunately abandoned, so they will believe that justice was done- and they won comfortably with a goal in each half, ending any Littlehampton hopes that they would climb into the top five and picking up their first win since Bonfire Night in the process. It was very much the Kieron show, as Campbell opened the scoring on thirty four minutes and McCann sealed the win half an hour later. The Golds saw Jordan Layton enter the field as a substitute on twenty eight minutes and depart it with a red card seventeen minutes later. Faversham are twelve points from safety- but this will give them hope.













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PMW's RAMBLINGS - INSIDE THE PROGRAMME - I'LL DO IT MYSELF



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The View from Garry Haylock

Welcome to the players, staff, officials and supporters of Southall, I hope they enjoy their brief stay with us and have a safe journey home.

It has been an interesting week in the Binfield world, two very professional performances that brought very different results, the three points gained at Bedfont was hard fought and very welcome, while on Tuesday I felt that we were more than deserving of at least a point. I was surprised by the elation shown by our opponents midweek after their victory, it does seem to be a little early in the season to be celebrating in such a way and the comments on social media were vociferous to say the least. One of the many things that I have learnt in the course of what feels like a long career, is that there are no trophies given out in January!!

Having said that, we are entering a critical period of the season, every club has kind of an idea as to where they will be finishing come the end of April and I have been fortunate to have enjoyed many seasons where it was all to play for, which is where we find ourselves right now. Any team that can put together a run of 6-8 victories over the next 10 games can catapult themselves into the title or play off reckoning.

My message to the players after their fantastic effort during the week was that we are only now entering the second half of the season and there are still 54 points available so now is the time to up our game. On that note the transfer window for the clubs higher up the pyramid closed this week with the usual last minute deals done in a panic. I was fortunate that I was never subject to a last minute move and have tried very hard to stay away from leaving any business that late when I was involved at that level.

The implications of the window closing for ourselves will only start to filter down over the next couple of weeks as the clubs at the lower levels can now start to look at those players that didn't get the higher moves they wanted and gradually we will start to see movement at our level. The right signing could be the impetus to set off a run of results that can carry a team over the line and I will be keeping a close eye on the players that I have previously targeted that I feel could bolster our excellent, albeit short staffed group!

DID YOU see the video of former Cardiff City manager Mark Hudson on social media recently? The first part shows him telling his sons he has been appointed assistant and their pride is clear to see.

In the second part, he is telling them he is out of a job and they will be moving again, but not to worry: "That's football".

That is indeed and unfortunately we're probably all a bit guilty of forgetting the human side of it. Away from the pitch there is a reality we don't always see. Occasionally we get little glimpses into it. like with Hudson's video.

As football fans on the outside, it's easy to see everything as black and white, winning and losing. If a player doesn't play very well, it's because he's not up to it. More often than not, we don't stop to consider what else might be going on. In this role I've come to learn there are often deeply personal reasons why a player might not be performing – or why a manager might not be able to get the results despite the fact they're putting in all the hours they can. Hereford manager Josh Gowling saw Hudson's video and it resonated. In Sunday's NLP he took on the subject in his column to give us a unique insight into what it is like as a Non-League gaffer. He wrote: "When we lose a game, my missus will message me: Are you ok? I have a four-hour drive home after the majority of our games. That's a lot of time to go over things in my head. "When I get home I will get a nice cuddle from her and my kids, but she knows I won't be in a good place. "Look, I've chosen to do this so it's not an excuse, but it can take you away from your family in an emotional sense.

"When you're with your kids but your team is on a three-game losing streak, you're not fully present.

"I'm sure many other managers will say the same. This is your life. When it's not working, your life doesn't work."

The majority of managers say the same. Football is a unique 24/7 world, where there is very little time to switch off.

You certainly need to be a certain character to take on the job and deal with your week's work being played out in full view of the public. Even at Non-League level.

"Everything is out there to see," Gowling wrote. "It's on social media, in the news, if kids go to school in the area you manage, they might get some stick. There is no escape from the game." That's partly why they all do it. Football gets under all our skin. However you interact with the game, it's because we love it.

Gowling also says being a manager is the best job in the world. And that is probably why so many come back to try again after they disappointments. That's football...

BINFIELD FC FALL TO NARROW DEFEAT VS BASINGSTOKE TOWN

Binfield FC's resilient Moles fall to a 1-0 defeat against the Isthmian League leaders Basingstoke Town on Tuesday night.

George Reid's 75th minute strike earned Basingstoke all three points to keep them at the top of the Isthmian South Central table. The Moles were reduced to ten men in added time after Massimo Giamattei was dismissed for a second bookable offence, which marked the end of a frustrating evening for the Moles, despite showing their ability to compete against the league's top sides.

The first ten minutes of the game were fairly even and it remained that way until James Beauchamp managed to keep the ball under control in the area, but couldn't manage to find the space to get his shot away. It was then when the game really started to open up and have some real fire. Simon Dunn's spectacular 25-yard free kick came closest to breaking the deadlock for Basingstoke but his effort was equally matched by Harvey Rackley-Hayes in the Binfield goal.

Basingstoke came close again just before half time through Sam Argent as he broke through the Moles defence, only to be denied by the left hand of Rackley-Hayes, who again was a big presence, as he has been throughout the whole campaign.

Harvey Harry, who scored a brace in Binfield's last match, came closest for the Moles after he managed to capitalise on a rare Paul Strudley error as he dropped Brad Pagliaroli's cross, only to have his effort cleared off the line...

Basingstoke's class pulled through, and their dominance and quality in attacking areas showed, when George Reid picked up the ball on the Basingstoke right hand side, before cutting inside and finishing into the far corner to send the Basingstoke fans behind the goal into pandemonium. This was Reid's 12th goal of the season, in just 22 appearances, and he showed why he's one of the most feared attackers in the Isthmian League.

Basingstoke showed their experience, and just why they're competing at the top of the league, as they managed last fifteen minutes of the game superbly and managed to secure all three points.

Binfield's frustrations from the night seemed to worsen as Massimo Giamattei was sent off for a second bookable offence, after a challenge on the half way line was punished by the referee.

SOUTHALL FOOTBALL CLUB

A Brief History of Southall FC

Southall Football Club is one of the oldest clubs in the South East of England having been founded in March 1871, their first match being a 1-0 defeat against local neighbours Uxbridge played at Southall Park on October 21st 1871. Southall quickly established themselves as a major club locally and entered the FA Cup in the 3rd year of the competition. Uxbridge remained their main local rivals during the first few decades since the founding of both clubs in 1871. Southall joined the prestigious Southern League for the 1896-97 season, during which time they regularly played the likes of Brentford, Fulham, Watford, Brighton & Hove Albion and Wycombe Wanderers. Southall used several grounds in the town before finally settling in at their Western Road ground in 1906, after merging with Southall Athletic FC. Western Road remained their home until the early 1990's. The most successful period for the club was between the 1920's up to the 1960's, when crowds numbering in the thousands regularly attended, especially for games against local rivals such as Hayes, Hounslow and Uxbridge and the club produced several Amateur Internationals and players that went on to join professional clubs during this period. For the big away games and important cup ties away from home coaches and trains were often chartered for the locals to follow the club's exploits.

In 1925 Southall reached the Final of the FA Amateur Cup, when they narrowly lost to Clapton 2-1 at Millwall FC in front of over 25,000 spectators and won the Athenian League title in 1926-27. Another momentous season occurred in 1935-36 when Southall recorded 17 consecutive cup victories in various competitions. During this season they became the first non-league club to start in the FA Cup Extra Preliminary Round and reach the 3rd Round Proper before finally losing to Third Division South professionals Watford in front of Western Road's record gate of 19,094. They also beat Third Division South club Swindon Town at home 3-1 in the FA Cup 1st Round. Their cup exploits that season meant that they had to play 23 matches between 1st April and 2nd May, which included 2 games on the same day twice!

The club were forced to take the decision to sell their ground to the local Council in 1940 due to financial pressures during World War II and became tenants of the Council for the rest of that ground's existence.

Southall have also played big Amateur Cup matches at Stamford Bridge, Highbury & Craven Cottage, all in front of over 20,000 fans. The club's last big cup day out was for the 1986 FA Vase Final at Wembley. In the 1970's and 1980's future full England Internationals Gordon Hill, Alan Devonshire, and Les Ferdinand played for Southall in their younger days.

Western Road was the arguably finest non-league ground in the area, regularly being selected to host finals and semi-finals of local and county cup competitions. It had a fine clubhouse, which regularly held many social events and was hired out by local clubs and societies as well as regularly being a venue for local bands to play at.

Unfortunately, Ealing Council closed Western Road in the early 1990's and eventually
