BINFIELD FC HISTORY

Binfield FC first played in 1892, during the reign of Queen Victoria, making us one of the oldest Association Football clubs in the world! The team comprised young men from the local brickworks and those who worked on the land around Binfield. The club's early years were spent in the Ascot and District League, where we enjoyed many successful seasons winning the Fielden Cup for the first time in 1924 and on eleven further occasions since.

During the 2nd World War, we joined the Great Western Combination League, winning the championship in 1947. During that period we also won the Berks and Bucks Junior Cup and the Maidenhead Norfolkian Cup and it was not unusual to see crowds in excess of 1,000 at our Forest Road ground.

In 1950 we joined the Reading and District League, where we remained for the next forty years. In 1972 Binfield won promotion to the Premier Division for the first time and although relegated two years later we returned in 1976 as 1st Division Champions. A huge crowd, reminiscent of the 1940's, packed Forest Road to witness our promotion. In 1980, the club made an important decision to move from Forest Road, where facilities were shared with the cricket club, to our current site in Hill Farm Lane. Turning that field into the football ground we see today was a massive task. Thanks to an enormous amount of physical work by the members of the club the area was levelled and drained within three years. The members then set about building the club house. This progress off the field was matched on it when in 1987 and 1988 we won Division 2 and then Division 1 of the Reading and District League. In 1989, we joined the high-profile Charrington Chiltonian League, winning the Division 1 title at the first attempt - a feat we repeated in 1996 - and reaching the final of the League Cup. The following year we finished runners-up to Peppard, despite remaining unbeaten from November until the end of the campaign.

In 2001 we merged with Binfield's junior club, Binfield Forest FC, and in doing so significantly increased the member-ship, with over 20 teams playing every weekend - this season we will field 36 teams each week. The junior part of the club is very important to Binfield with FA Charter status having been achieved in 2007 and in 2013 we were awarded the Berks & Bucks FA and South East Regional FA Charter Status Community Club of the Year awards, culminating in the club being invited to the FA Community Shield at Wembley in August 2013.

Since 2005, progress at the club has been swift, with the addition of floodlights and later a seated stand. The club is tirelessly working to improve our facilities with our "continuous improvement" plan making further change to the car park, to the club house and a new stand around our Tea Bar. We constantly strive to improve all elements of the facilities from changing rooms to a playing surface we are extremely proud of, to benefit everyone from our Under 6s up to our 1st Team. We won the FTL Hellenic League Division 1 East title in 2008-09 and gained promotion to the next level of English football, where we finished runners up in the 2010/11 UHlsport Hellenic Premier Division, 3rd in 2012/13 and 5th in 2014.

August 15th 2009 will long be remembered as Binfield's first game in the legendary FA Cup - and we have enjoyed some good runs reaching the 1st Qualifying round in each of the last two seasons with 400 supporters enjoying the visit of Margate in 2010 and a trip to Slough Town and narrow defeat in 2011. In 2013 the side reached the 2nd Qualifying round, losing to a 96th minute free kick as Leatherhead came from behind. Binfield entered the FA Vase for the first time in season 2008-09 and enjoyed three rounds, before reaching the 4th round (last 32) in 2011/12 in an incredible season of cup success. The 2011/12 team is the most successful in our history, winning both the Berks & Bucks FA Senior Trophy and the AM Print & Copy Floodlit Cup in five glorious April 2012 days. We also reached the final of the Hellenic Challenge Cup.

In the two Covid disrupted seasons, the first team were sitting in second place in the Hellenic Premier. Positions when used to calculate points per game resulted in promotion to the Isthmian League South Centre, our 1st season ever at Step 4. However the 2020/21 season will, of course, be remembered for our amazing run in the Buildbase FA Vase when playing every game behind closed doors bar one and all away from home we reached the Final at Wembley where we came up against a very good Warrington Rylands side and narrowly lost 3-2.

In 2021/22 season in the Isthmian South Central, the team finished 8th after a good start. Disappointing FA Cup but a very good run in the Trophy. Winning at North Leigh, Herne Bay before a home win vs Chippenham and finally bowing out against Truro, missing a last minute penalty. In the 2022/23 season, the team finished 6th in the Isthmian South Central - our highest ever league position. In the FA Cup, we reached the 3q round, again our best ever performance, losing 5-3 away to Beckenham Town. In the FA Trophy, we lost in the 1st round proper away to Tavistock.

The 2023/24 will always be remembered as the season of the Great Escape. At Christmas, the team had no wins in the league, only 4 points and were rooted to the bottom of the table. Their only win was a 2-0 victory over Wokingham in the FA Cup. They were knocked out of the FA Cup after a replay at Northwood. There was poor performances in the FA Trophy and Velocity Cups with 7-1 and 6-0 defeats respectively. A management change just before Christmas with Ross Weatherstone taking charge. In his time in charge, Ross managed to guide the team to their first win against Met Police FC. The team finished with 8 wins and managed to finish 4 points and one position above the relegation zone.

2024/25 was the year of the cup run and giant killings. In the Velocity Cup, the Moles were on the road for every game and made it through to the semi-final beating Premier Division sides Dulwich Hamlet and Hasting United before losing to a strong Billericay Town. In the Berks and Bucks Senior Cup, they defeated National League side Maidenhead United before losing in the quarter finals to Flackwell Heath. In the league, the Moles improved slightly from last season finishing one position higher and with nine more points.

BINFIELD VS HARTLEY WINTNEY

Bank. Holiday. Football. Do we need to say anymore? We to the Iconic Stadium for the afternoon's Isthmian League fixture against Hartley Wintney. It is the first of two meetings in a month between the two sides after they were drawn together in the Velocity Cup.



And how's this for a stat? In the four recorded meetings between the two sides, the away sides has won ALL four games by at least two goals - a stat the Moles will be hoping to end this afternoon.

On paper, this season has a lot of similarities to the start of last season for the Moles. After a professional performance against Winslow United in the FA Cup, it has been a slow start for them in the league prior to this weekend and a narrow defeat to Marlow saw them knocked out of the FA Cup.

But as we know football is about fine margins. The Moles went ahead against both Horndean & Ascot in an entertaining game that could've easily finished 5-5. If you also factor in a converted penalty on Saturday then things could've looked a lot different at the start of the season. There's plenty of positive to take from the Moles, including a hot start in front of goal for Ethan Lindo, but the target is to string it into a complete performance.

It is a different story for our visitors this afternoon. A comprehensive victory at home to Hendon was followed up by a brilliant second half at Moneyfields to make it two wins from two. Alex Body has started the season with three goals from his four games and despite the disappointment of exiting the cup with a narrow defeat at Fareham Town, it has been a success start to the season.

BINFIELD VS HARTLEY WINTNEY

Tues 18th February: Hartley Wintney 0-2 Binfield (League)

As we mentioned, the away team has dominated this fixture across the years. In the first edition between the two sides last season, it was the Moles who walked away with the points. In a surprise result, Rechan Esprit's volley right on half time gave them in what was one of our goal of the season contenders.



The Moles were able to hold on in the second half and a Rahzir Smith-Jones penalty with one of the last kicks of the game wrapped up the points in what was one of their best performances of the season during a purple patch in the season for the Moles.



Sat 11th March: Binfield 0-4 Hartley Wintney (League)

Less than a month later, the two sides met again and Hartley Wintney got their revenge. After a tight first half with Ellis Orsborn's goal separating the two sides, Hartley Wintney turned it on in the second half with Orsborn grabbing his second before former Moles captain Liam Gavin got himself on the scoresheet. And despite a penalty save by CJ Fubler earlier in the half, Connor Lynch did grab a goal and Hartley travelled home with the points.

INTRODUCING OUR VISITORS

HARTLEY WINTNEY FC

Hartley Wintney Football Club was founded in 1897, the club's nickname 'The Row' coming from Hartley Row, a former hamlet of Hartley Wintney.

In the 1940s and 50s, the club played at Causeway Farm adjacent to the cricket club, in the Basingstoke League. The minutes of meetings covering 15 seasons from 1948, compiled by the club's outstanding secretary Fred Cook, includes the change of club colours from blue squares to tangerine in 1956.

The club moved to the Memorial Ground on Green Lane in 1953 and later joined the Aldershot League. In 1973, Glynn Howells was appointed as manager. In his six-year reign, the team won the Aldershot Senior League three times in succession, and the Aldershot Senior Cup.

A founder member of the Combined Counties League in 1978, Hartley later appointed Ian Bedford as manager. An influx of senior players during the 80s included several ex-pros: Mick Travers (ex-Reading, Portsmouth and Aldershot); Richard Walden (ex-Aldershot, Sheffield Wednesday and Newport County) and Steve Finnieston (ex-Chelsea, Cardiff City and Sheffield United).

Under Bedford's management, the club won the Aldershot Senior Cup (1980/81), the George Allen Cup (1981/82) and the Combined Counties League (1982/83). A new clubhouse was opened with David Willoughby, secretary and treasurer, and Bill Mitchell, club chairman, devoting exceptional hours to this venture.

The club gained promotion to the Combined Counties Premier under the management of Mike Scott in 2007/08, but the following season ended in relegation. The team rallied following the appointments of Pete Gray and John Condon in 2009/10 and Louis King in 2010/11.

Neville Roach then took charge for 2011/12, assisted by Mick Wollen and Scott Tarr, and the club finished 3rd in CCL Div. 1, which was good enough for a return to the Premier Division. But the euphoria of promotion was dampened when the coaching staff and nearly the entire squad left at the end of the season.

Ex-Millwall defender Dave Tuttle was given the summer to prepare a squad for 2012/13. However, a string of poor results led to a second change in management within four months and 24-year-old ex-Hartley striker Ben Dillon was given his first managerial role.

Alongside Jason Minton and Joe Lawler, Dillon set about rebuilding, with Hartley well adrift at the bottom of the table. The introduction of a talented group of players restored the spirit around the club and, in what became known as the club's 'Great Escape', the Row's place in the CCL Premier was secured against all the odds.

Finishing 7th in CCL Premier in 2013/14, the footballing highlight was the run to the 4th Qualifying Round of the FA Cup for the first ever time, losing to Daventry Town in front of a home crowd of over 1,000.

The new club crest was commissioned during the season; designer Philippa Bell incorporated elements from the 13th century when the village of Hertleye Wynteneye drew its name from 'the clearing in the forest where the deer graze by Winta's island', hence the tree and stag motifs. 2015/16 was very eventful. After a memorable FA Cup win at Merthyr Town, Hartley came back from two down, only to concede an injury time goal at Conference South side Eastbourne Borough. In the FA Vase, a longstanding club record was broken by reaching the 5th Round Proper. In front of a sellout 1,300 at Green Lane, eventual finalists Hereford proved too strong, but the Row went on to claim the CCL Premier Division title; however, promotion was denied due to ground grading.

The 2016/17 season under Brownlie and Millerick was extraordinary. Propelled by the goals of strike duo Sam Argent and Ross Cook, the Row topped the CCL Premier Division for the entire season, reached the semi-final of the Hampshire Senior Cup and the final of the Aldershot Senior Cup. The club secured the required ground grading to take their place in the Southern League at Step 4 for the first time.

2017/18 was as successful as the previous season. The club embarked on their first FA Trophy campaign, going out in the 1st Round Proper to eventual finalists Bromley. In Southern League South (East Division), the Row sat within the top four for much of the season. A play-off place was secured, with the Row winning their semi-final against AFC Dunstable. In front of a crowd of over 700 at Green Lane, a tense game against Cambridge City was decided by a Nic Ciardini goal - who was on the end of Jack Ball's towering header - to gain promotion to Southern Premier South at Step 3.

There was deep sadness in 2021 when club president Bill Mitchell passed away in April. He had been a huge influence on the club and a true gentleman who continued his family's tradition of being Hartley Wintney through and through.

Development team manager Ross Weatherstone and first team coach Ty Newton were appointed as joint managers for 2022/23. Pre-season results were encouraging, but the team struggled in the league and the pair resigned in October. Ex-Arsenal pro Ian Selley and his assistant, Mick Bennett, took charge but, after a reasonable start, results again failed to meet expectations.

With the club in the relegation zone, the Row turned to two former players, ex-pro Rowan Vine, and Shane Hollamby. The pair steadied the ship, returned belief to the fans and the playing group, and worked the team back to being competitive in every game. But the lack of financial headroom finally hit home. Without the cutting edge of a proven goalscorer to turn the draws and narrow losses into wins, the Row were relegated.

After so much recent success, 2023/24 sees Hartley Wintney FC in transition and looking to rebuild as the club takes its place in the Isthmian League South Central division.

Season 2024/25 sees another change of management and almost a new squad. Joint managers Jamie Daltry and John Cooke are looking to steer The Row to success after their own successful season at Knaphill where they took the Knappers to the CCL playoff semi final.

PRECISELY 104 days after Aldershot Town and Whitstable Town lifted the Isuzu FA Trophy and FA Vase respectively at a sun-drenched Wembley Stadium, Non-League's two premier cup competitions are back for another eagerly-awaited campaign.

This afternoon, the 2025-26 FA Trophy kicks off with 32 clubs from Step 4 contesting 16 preliminary round ties.

A record 336 entrants begin the 12-round Road to Wembley and perhaps slightly unfortunate to be made to qualify is Grays Athletic, who have a proud FA Trophy history having won the second of two consecutive finals 20 years ago with victory over Woking, a year after beating Hucknall Town on penalties.

They make the trip this afternoon to Eastern Counties League Premier champions Brantham Athletic, one of four clubs making their FA Trophy debuts.

Rugby Borough, Hassocks FC and last season's FA Vase runners-up, AFC Whyteleafe, are the others with their sights set on a potentially lucrative run into the latter stages and the visit of a National League big gun.

In this week's NLP, our friends at @Non-League Factfile were back with all the facts and figures ahead of this afternoon's ties - and once again there was plenty to mull over.

Four clubs are looking to equal their best FA Trophy run with victory in this preliminary round, namely Garforth Town, Wellingborough Town, Gorleston FC and Westbury United, while ten ties involve clubs that will meet each other in league games this season.

And there's plenty of scores to settle on the field too with three of the 16 ties involving clubs that have met in the FA Trophy before.

Three years ago, Hanworth Villa beat Northwood 3-0 and Bashley defeated Frome Town 4-1, both in the first qualifying round. Margate knocked out Egham Town in the second qualifying round eight years ago.

The Isuzu FA Vase is equally as fascinating with no fewer than 623 having entered - the highest tally for six years.

This weekend, 202 first qualifying round ties take place up and down the country, involving 404 clubs from Steps 5 and 6.

Seven former FA Vase winners are in action: Whitley Bay (four times, 2001-02, 2008-09, 2009-10, 2010-11), Brigg Town (1995-96, 2002-03), Romford FC (2023-24), Thatcham Town (2018), Diss Town (1994), Stansted FC (1984) and Hoddesdon Town, the first club to lift the Vase at Wembley Stadium in 1974-75.

In contrast, 26 clubs are participating in the FA Vase for the first time with four more entering in the next round, on September 6.

The tie between Grangetown Boys Club and Leeds Ultra Football Academy guarantees there will be at least five debut clubs in the next round.

Step 6 clubs have enjoyed solid Vase campaigns in recent years and this first qualifying round draw ensured that 61 tenth-tier clubs will progress to the next round (plus Boldon Community Association who have a walkover).

At least 44 Step 5 clubs will exit in this round with a possibility of an upset in 97 ties.

Thirteen clubs will be looking to make history by tasting Vase victory for the first time, while Newcastle Blue Star, Shirehampton FC and Horbury Town are all looking for a first win at their third attempt.

The tie between Club Thorne Colliery and Horbury Town is the only tie to guarantee a club making second qualifying round tie for the first time, while three other ties will see the winners at least equal their best Vase run - Retford FC versus Appleby Frodingham, AFC Aldermaston v Bristol Telephones and St Day v Stoke Gabriel and Torbay Police.

Twenty-three ties involve clubs that have met in FA Vase before, but Stafford Town v Tividale FC is the only one to have occurred more than once before. They have one win apiece in their past Vase meetings.

And talking of grudge matches, Southern Combination side Pagham FC have had to wait 49 years for the opportunity to avenge a 7-0 defeat by Newport (IOW) - the longest of any side in the competition. So, the first of ten rounds on the Road to Wembley starts here with the four Finals Day contenders contesting Non-League's most prestigious prizes under the arch on Sunday May 17, 2026.

It's an occasion to savour and a fitting finale to two much-loved competitions which grow in stature year on year.

Start your engines, it promises to be a bumpy ride.
